10 Commandments of Technical Presentations

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Why make a Presentation?

Required

Marketing

Sell (an idea)

Share Knowledge

Help others

Preparing

Be Nervous

Nervous: Tells that you care about the presentation, about being there, doing well

Then Turn that into Action

Dig in to the details

Anticipate Questions

What would a curious mind ask?

Read from multiple sources

Show only examples you've tried

The rule of The First 3 Talks Suck

Never, ever, present from slides created by someone else

Delivery

The most difficult task today is keeping people's attention

The first few minutes of a presentation counts a lot

Information Density

Don't tell us, at length, what you won't tell us

Set Expectations—remind the audience what they'll learn from your presentation

Even if they've read your abstract ahead of time

Don't deliver raw facts

Our goal is not to tell them everything there is to know

Inspire, promote learning

Tell us your story, but not a tale!

Wear your passion on the sleeve

Express your positive feelings Be objective

Don't read from slides

... but if you have to

Slides

Avoid bullet ridden corpse

Avoid long/full sentences

Make audience want to listen rather than read slides

Code (in slides)

Font size in proportion to room size

Visit the room ahead to find out or ask the organizers

Demo & Live Coding

High Risk area

Prepare for connectivity to fail

Prepare for system error, incompatibilities

Avoid live coding

Takes a lot of effort to get this right

Too many moving parts, easy to fail

Use recorded Demos instead

Huge time saver Highly stable Narrate / lipsync

If you decide to live code

Be ready for things to fail

Don't mumble at errors

Damn the torpedo

Sequence the contents

Avoid the knowledge chasm

Start from the known

attack just one unknown at a time

walk audience along knowledge deltas

Face the audience

Don't look at the screen, glance at your window

Make eye contact

Avoid Mannerisms


